

Michael Likosky is a Principal at 32 Advisors. He holds a doctorate in law from Oxford University.

He serves as an Expert on public-private partnerships to the United Nations, Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, and Clinton Global Initiative. His work has been supported by philanthropic foundations, including Ford Foundation, Rockefeller Foundation, and Markle Foundation.

Mr. Likosky is widely recognized as the leading advisor on public-private partnerships to governmental officials within the United States. He has held honorary positions such as co-Chair of California Governor Edmund Brown Jr.'s Task Force to Modernize the CA Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank. Mr. Likosky has served as an advisor to the US Treasury Department; US Senators; Members of the US House of Representatives; leading state agencies such as New York's Empire State Economic Development Corporation and also CA's Business, Transportation and Housing Agency; and the cities of Chicago and Newark.

Through his expert role within the United Nations he has provided advisory to low and medium income countries on investments into infrastructure, oil, gas, and mining. He has been a regular contributor to their World Investment Reports and World Development Reports. Mr. Likosky was also involved in advising the Democratic Republic of the Congo on the renegotiation of its fifty major public-private partnership contracts in the extractives sector.

He consults regularly to investors and multinational firms on public-private partnership opportunities. Mr. Likosky provides independent advice on navigating and succeeding within complex political environments. He is a leading advisor to pension funds on investments into infrastructure.

Mr. Likosky has published the touchstone books on public-private partnerships globally including three with Cambridge University Press. His most recent book has helped drive the movement within the US to pursue public-private partnerships.

He has taught in leading law schools. Mr. Likosky was Professor of International Economic Law in the Law School of the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London. He founded and directed the Center on Law and Public Finance at New York University. He has held posts and fellowships at Oxford University Law, NYU Law, Fordham Law, Wisconsin Law, and the University of Bonn.

His views on the direction of the infrastructure sector are widely sought after. He regularly publishes opinion pieces and makes appearances in the New York Times including Deal Book, Wall Street Journal, CNN Money, McKinsey Matters, Associated Press, Reuters, Bloomberg, Bond Buyer, and elsewhere. He has given keynote addresses and featured talks to the US Chamber of Commerce, International Project Finance International, American Society of Civil Engineers, International Project Finance Association, Oxford Law, Harvard Law, Yale, and elsewhere.
